1. Introduction

This annual summary bulletin brings together crime statistics from the Metropolitan Police Service (MPS) and British Transport Police (BTP) to provide a summary of recorded crime relating to TfL's public transport networks during Financial Year (FY) 2016/17 (1 April 2016-31 March 2017). This annual bulletin focuses on the London Bus network, London Underground (LU) / Docklands Light Railway (DLR)¹, London Tramlink, London Overground (LO) and TfL Rail service.

The figures reported in this bulletin for the bus network are based on official MPS figures for bus-related crime unless otherwise stated. There is no distinct category of 'bus crime' in the MPS crime recording system. Recorded crime data is extracted from the MPS system using a complex query that searches all MPS crime for transport venue codes and those that have the word bus, bus stop, bus station and transport related words somewhere in the electronic case file. For this reason, some crimes that did not occur on the bus network will be included in the figures. This is different from the BTP as all crimes dealt with by the BTP and included on their crime recording system relate directly to the rail network.

Recorded crime figures relate to crime recorded by the MPS and BTP during FY 2016/17 and are consistent with Home Office counting rules. The figures do not include incidents that have not been reported to the police or those that the police decide not to record as crimes.

Public transport in London continues to be a safe and low crime environment. Currently, over ten million passengers travel on the TfL's public transport services each day with very few of them ever experiencing or witnessing crime.

The headline figures include:

- The levels of pan-modal transport crime² excluding TfL Rail in 2016/17 were 0.5% higher (161 additional offences) compared with the previous year. The rate of crime has also increased slightly to 7.5 crimes per million passenger journeys (from 7.4 in 2015/16).
- Levels of bus-related crime in 2016/17 were 2.0% lower (356 fewer offences) compared with the previous year. The rate of crime for the bus network has remained at 7.5 crimes per million passenger journeys.
- Crime on LU/DLR increased during 2016/17 by 6.0% (643 additional offences) compared with the previous year. The rate of crime also increased to 7.6 crimes per million passenger journeys (from 7.3 in 2015/16).
- Crime on LO decreased during 2016/17 by 8.0% (100 fewer offences) compared with the previous year. The rate of crime also decreased to 6.1 (from 6.8 in 2015/16).
- Crime on London Tramlink decreased by 9.8% during 2016/17 (26 fewer offences) compared with the previous year. The rate of crime also decreased to 8.1 crimes per million passenger journeys (from 9.6 in 2015/16).

¹ Crime figures for LU and DLR are reported together as these networks are policed by the same division of the BTP, in future reports the LU and DLR networks will be reported on separately to reflect the new BTP policing model effective from April 2017.

² The pan-modal transport crime figure and rate is based on the aggregate crime and passenger journey figures for the bus, LU/DLR, Tramlink and LO networks. TfL did not operate the TfL Rail service until 30^{th} May 2015. Therefore comparisons with previous years cannot be made. For this reason, crime figures for the TfL Rail network are not included in the pan-TfL crime figures.

While levels of transport crime remain low, TfL and its transport policing partners remain focussed on those networks and crime types that have seen an increase.

Measures have been put in place to deal with the upward trend in violence / serious public order offences seen on some rail modes, most notably London Underground/Docklands Light Railway network. The rise is largely due to an increase in low level violence, pushing and shoving, verbal disputes and threatening behaviour at busy commuter times when services are at peak capacity. Despite the upward trend in recorded incidents, overall there remain a very low number of offences with only 2.8 VAP/serious public order offences for every million passenger journeys made on London Underground/Docklands Light railway network. Concerted action is underway to address these offences and TfL is working with the BTP to implement a problem-solving approach to deal with this issue, with targeted action plans focussed on priority transport hubs which have seen the largest volume of offences. Other measures include high visibility policing and targeted action against offenders combined with TfL's travel demand management and communications activities to encourage improved passenger behaviour. However, targeting violence/public order offences on transport networks remains challenging given their sporadic nature

It should also be noted, that there were some changes to the way that some offences were recorded within the VAP and serious public order offences throughout the year. For the purposes of comparison with previous years, these categories should be combined.

Levels of violence on the bus network remained stable but it remains a priority and efforts to drive this down continue.

Reported sexual offences on the transport system have continued to rise in 2016/17. This was anticipated and is considered a positive result of the ongoing efforts to tackle unwanted sexual behaviour on public transport and to increase confidence in reporting sexual offences. The Project Guardian initiative and Report It To Stop It campaign are part of an ongoing effort to reduce the risk of becoming a victim, challenge unwanted sexual behaviour and target offenders. This important work continues.



2. Bus-related crime 2014/15-2016/17

Table 2 shows the break-down of MPS bus-related³ crime by the major crime categories used by the MPS for 2014/15, 2015/16 and 2016/17. It includes the rate of crime⁴ for each of these categories with the exception of burglary⁵. In 2016/17, there were 7.5 crimes for every million passenger journeys made on the bus network. Borough bus-related crime figures are shown in table 3.




Map 1 – Bus-related crime volume by borough

Map I shows the breakdown of MPS bus-related crime by borough for 2016/17. The darker shades of purple show the boroughs with the highest number of recorded bus-related crimes. The map has not been adjusted for passenger or population numbers. Borough bus-related crime figures are shown in Table 3. Please note that the map below does not include data for the City of London; this is policed by the City of London Police (CoLP) which is a separate police force from the MPS.



Map 2 – Bus-related crime change between 2015/16 and 2016/17 by borough

Map 2 shows the percentage change in the levels of bus-related crime by borough⁶ between 2015/16 and 2016/17. The lighter blue boroughs have seen reductions in crime. The boroughs shaded in the darkest blue have seen an increase in levels of crime. Borough bus-related crime figures are shown in Table 3.



⁶ It is not possible to create similar maps of BTP recorded crime. The exact location of crimes upon the rail network is unknown due to some victims identifying the offence at the end of their journey which was undertaken across more than one borough.

3. London Underground and Docklands Light Railway crime 2014/15–2016/17

Table 4 provides a breakdown of the major crime categories 7 used by the BTP for the LU and DLR networks in $2014/15^8$, 2015/16 and $2016/17^9$. There were 7.6 crimes for every million passenger journeys made on the LU and DLR networks in 2016/17.

4. London Overground crime 2014/15 – 2016/17

Table 5 provides a breakdown of the major crime categories used by the BTP for the LO network in 2014/15, $2015/16^{11}$ and $2016/17^{12}$. There were 6.1 crimes for every million passenger journeys made on the LO network in 2016/17.

5. TfL Rail crime 2016/17
